
7 pm: Shady Lawn Garden

Hogwarts rises, LEGO by LEGO

But an enterprising group of 25 young library visitors rolled up their sleeves and brought their knowledge of the Harry Potter books to bear as they constructed a miniature duplicate of Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry (bought with Friends of the Library funds). Harry, Hermione, Ron, Professor McGonagall and even Snape would be proud of the effort, which took a total of 20 hours to build. We "Muggles" may view the finished castle by visiting the children's library.

Rosemary Hamblin's support for the library still continues

Rosemary Hamblin, who passed away February 2, was a true friend of the BCPL. Library patrons may not realize how much Mrs. Hamblin contributed to the BCPL, but Library Director Georgia de Araujo says Rosemary's efforts have created a lasting legacy.

"Rosemary established a trust fund in honor of her mother, Elizabeth Thurman, as a long-term way to support the Library and all the services it provides. The extended Thurman-Hamblin family made donations to this Trust Fund over many years. While the principle remains untouched, the annual proceeds are used to support library services in a va-

riety of areas, such as children's services, support of the Bookmobile/Outreach program, and improvements to different subject areas of the print book collection," says Georgia.

"Rosemary was also an active member of the Friends of the Library and volun-


teered her time to support many activities undertaken by the Friends over many years."



We say 'thank you' during Library Week


Every library staff member gets a delicious lunch in celebration of National Library Week April 7-13.
